


















When Sophomoes Speak, == || Freshmen Listen...









WÈRE ON THE RIGHT TRACK...

HOME-COMING 1980...




Through the time span of three days, NNC seemed to become a world within itself with the various and splendid events taking place all over the campus.





After some relaxing music by Jim Bennett to set the mood of the evening, a steak dinner was served with all of the trimmings.





On January 31, NNC reversed its direction momentarily to relive memories of the slicked down, red-polished past.




"Pi Pa Chi" or **The Tale of the Lute** is considered the masterpiece of the Kun-Chu plays. Its composition is regarded as the cause of the revival of the Southern School of drama in the Yuan Dynasty (A.D. 1277-1368). Written by Kao-Tong-Kia, an adaptation of it was made in the year 1404 for presentation at the Imperial Court of Peking. Since that date it has enjoyed a continuous stage life for close to 600 years.













This fall NNC's drama department undertook a play production considerably different from productions in recent years. Despite its differing quality, Director Dr. Earl Owens maintained a professional touch in the Chinese drama, **The Lute Song.** Keeping within the play's basic cultural context, cast members (those with red, blonde, or brunette hair) dyed their hair black. Some wore painted faces also. Observed Joy Zellmer, "We (female actors) had to wear little socks and take little steps. We also had to bow a lot."

Characters wore bright, hand-made costumes and performed on a bare stage. The drama students portrayed a moving story revolving around the separation of Tsai-Yong and his wife, Tchao-On-Niang. The separation occurs when Tsai-Yong goes to the capital in an effort to be accepted in the Imperial court. Tsai-Yong is accepted but must marry a princess, Nieon-Chi. After Tchao-On-Niang (his first wife) sets out to find her longlost husband. When they eventually meet, Tsai-Yong does not recognize the thin Tchao-On-Niang. To reveal her identity, Niang sends an old familiar lute to her husband, who immediately recognizes the instrument. Tsai-Yong then searches for his first wife. In the end they are re-united.












With God in his house, sharing with friends, letting God love through me.




SNOW WHITE & THE SEVEN DWARFS





OBJECT: To graduate from the fine institute of NNC.



WINNER: The first person to graduate wins.























At last as the clouds parted, May 23 had finally arrived. The beach bums and bathing beauties came out of hiding and Malibu Fest '81 was under way.






ASNNC Executive Council



Senate cleans house

It is Tuesday, 6:30 p.m. ASNNC Executive Vice-President Nancy Moench gavels a meeting of the student Senate to order. Each week these twelve elected students gather to fulfill their duties as the lawmaking body of ASNNC. (Continued below).



Aside from the traditional duties of student/faculty committee appointments and budget preparations, the 1980-81 Senate conducted many housekeeping chores. Job descriptions for Senators and B.R.I.C.K. House directors were written; the function and effectiveness of student/faculty committees was reviewed; and an examination of the ASNNC Constitution was conducted. This examination produced a long list of amendments to clear up discrepancies.

The most controversial amendment dealt with Senate's power to dissolve clubs deemed ineffective and not beneficial to the student body. Sometimes called the most controversial amendment ever to come before the student body, this amendment had to survive a presidential veto, an editorial in the **Crusader** offering strong opposition, and a re-writing by the Senate. None of this, however, prevented it from being approved along with the rest of the amendments in a student vote.

The opening of the tennis courts on Sunday afternoons was also achieved due to the work of a Senate Ad Hoc committee. All in all, the year has proved to be one that will be long remembered.

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

NNC's student newspaper in 1980-81 was met with mixed reaction because it was often heavily spiced with satire and heralded a new openness in the letters to the editor.






Choir ministers in Europe.





What wears orange and white and makes noise? The answer is a revived organization known as the Spirit Freaks.



Karate Club




Team posts best season ever


Netters volley to a winning season.


Third year makes winning a tradition.


Harriers capture Fifth in District


With all the endurance and stamina needed to do well in cross country, this demanding sport is one in which few participate. But for those who do, it becomes a rewarding experience.


The Woman's Tennis Team wrapped up the season with a six win, twelve loss record. Number two player, Dana Michel came up with the most successful individual record of 8-4.



The Men's Track and Field of 1981 was characterized by several individuals establishing personal records and the emergence of some new talent.



All American








Adam Hat Sports Award


Maureen Freitag
