



NNC Pep Squad






Gamma Nu Gamma

Action Against Hunger's mission this year was to make a better impact on the campus, community, and the world as a whole. To meet this objective, a myriad of tasks were planned.

On the campus, we helped the students become more aware of the food waste. We put fliers on tables and made bulletin boards to make students more conscious of what they waste. We helped Marriott by weighing the amount of food wasted during a typical meal. The results turned out positive.

In the world, we planned a trip to Los Angeles for a Spring Break Work and Witness trip. After many fund raisers and requests to local churches for help, we decided that the Los Angeles idea was too far and we wanted to make an impact a little closer to home. We then looked to Portland, Oregon, and made contact with local missions and churches to see if there were needs. The response was: "We have many needs, can you help?" We began making detailed plans for Portland and the Work and Witness trip was set in stone.

Our base was a non-denominational Oregon City church. For a week, we worked in two missions located in the Burnside subdivision of Portland, a men's shelter and a women's shelter. We painted, cleaned, painted, organized, cooked, painted and even hosted a picnic for the women at the park near the river.

We originally planned to experience shelter life by sleeping in the shelters, but we felt that it was not safe. The top floor of the women's shelter was not owned by the shelter, and there were prostitutes and drug deals taking place. We ate most of our meals at the men's shelter and some at the other shelter. Don't let anyone ever tell y that shelter food is terrible. We met a cook and he told us that was a graduate from the Master school of Cornery. He someho lost everything he had and he ate at this shelter. Finally, he ask them if they needed an extra hand. This system works very well. V saw basketfuls of food brought in every day.


Lending a helpful hand

Sharing the love of God



7:00 p.m., Gene goes to the gym and drops the bar bell on his foot.


9:00-11:00, Gene tries to copy Pat's notes, and get some other studying done.


1:05pm: Well, maybe I'll stop into Kelly's room first.


Erik Nelson said that Bend

Tim Morgan sums it up best "The entertainment (Erik Nelson) was just the best.






Editor's Closing


