Improvements of Trevecca's network Home Page intended to bring order to TNU cyber community

The current Intranet Campus Exchange (I.C.E.) has been fairly effective in providing a location for information exchange and sharing. The organization of this space, however (primarily linear posts), has become increasingly confusing due to the increased usage and diverse needs of the users. In addition, we as a campus have become more aware of Internet technology and there are increasing requests for more complex features of exchange and discussion (dialogue) in addition to the information posts.

Based on information and feedback, we decided to design a system that would reflect these needs and provide opportunities for dialogue that

could be specific to the users rather than an open page for everyone. These specific opportunities would be in the form of a forum-based environment.

Listed in the box to the right is a quick comparison of the Current I.C.E. and the immediate enhancements introduced in I.C.E. v2

A document detailing the use of a forums package has been drafted by a collection of people in the open source community. CIT has edited this document slightly to apply to Trevecca's use of the Snitz forums package. CIT strongly encourages each community member who will be using I.C.E. v2 to read and familiarize themselves with the content of this document by logging on to <http://ice.trevecca.edu/snitz.doc>

In addition to the documentation available, CIT hosted 3 informational meetings located in the Quick Lecture Hall. These informational meetings were geared toward providing a demo of use for I.C.E v2.

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Trevecca remembers National Women's History Month

"Nobody sees a flower, really it is so small. We haven't time- and so to see takes time like a friend takes time."

Georgia O' Keefe, the originator of the above quote and the most celebrated American woman artist, was born to an Irish father and a Hungarian/Dutch mother, on November 15, 1887 near Sun Prairie, Wisconsin. At the age of 12 she decided to become a painter, proclaiming that it would be the only thing she could do that wouldn't be anybody's business. At the age of 14 Georgia O'Keefe's family relocated to Williamsburg, Virginia. There she enrolled at the Sacred Heart Academy and High School.

After graduation in 1904 from The Chatham Protestant Episcopal Institute, O'Keefe went seemingly all over the place in an extremely short amount of time. In 1904 she moved to Chicago to concentrate more on the art of painting with John Vanderpoel. In 1907 she transferred to Arts Students League in New York. In 1909 she taught in Amarillo, Texas.

In the summer of 1915 Georgia O'Keefe began taking classes and creating char-



coal drawings that she says were "so natural to my way of being and thinking that it hasn't occurred to me to put them down." O'Keefe sent

her drawings to a friend in New York who put them in the hands of Alfred Stieglitz who said, "at last a woman on paper!" He exhibited her

drawings and she became the talk of the town.

O'Keefe arrived in New York in 1918, and started a romance with the man who made her famous. O'Keefe's style included scenes of nature, the massive interior of flowers, and city scapes. O'Keefe efficiently painted the images of nature with essential colors, shapes and designs. She was known for Black Cross, New Mexico, Cow Skull-Red White and Blue, Cottonwood III, Cow's Skull with Calico Roses, Pansy, Poppy, Grey line and Morning Glory with Black.

In 1928, she sold a Calla Lily painting for \$25,000, proving that a female artist could live off of her art. O'Keefe was so enticed by the calla lily that she created nine paintings. She earned the name "The Lady of the Lily" in the 1920s because of her ability to represent the flower through art.

O'Keefe earned great respect from her fellow artisans. The white blooms and speared leaves of the calla lily started to interest American artists shortly after it was first imported from South Africa to America in the mid-nineteenth century. In the early twentieth century, it was popular mainly in the 1920s and 1930s, when many artists

chose to make the beautiful flower their main subject.

O'Keefe quickly grew tired of New York and moved to New Mexico where she was inspired by the fossils and rugged landscape. After the death of her husband Alfred Stieglitz she made Abiquiu, New Mexico her permanent residence and withdrew from public life. In 1971, her eyesight began to fail and she gave up painting. In 1973, Juan Hamilton inspired her to continue to work. O'Keefe died on March 6, 1986 at St. Vincent's Hospital in Santa Fe, New Mexico at the age of 98.

"Everyone has many associations with a flower," said O'Keefe, "You put out your hand to touch it, or lean forward to smell it, or maybe touch it with your lips almost without thinking, or give it to someone to please them. But one rarely takes the time to really see a flower. I have painted what each flower is to me and I have painted it big enough so that others would see what I see."

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SGA election results

The student body is in the midst of the Trevecca SGA election season. Just this past week, ballots were cast for ASB positions and speeches were made for Class Council elections. However, this election was quite unique compared to every other election in recent Trevecca history.

According to the SGA Constitution (2002-2003), ASB positions must be elected by majority vote, or a quorum. More or less, this means that out of the total number of undergraduate students enrolled, half of the students need to vote. Well, this time less than the required quorum voted, so that posed a problem. Circumstances were strange and things were slightly disorganized when the polls closed on Thursday (March 20), and the results of the election were posted without the quorum having been reached.

Come Monday morning, the ASB Executive Council (President James Storie, Executive Secretary Julie LaLone, and Vice President of Finance Heather Dahms), along with Dean Harris realized the mistake and after much discussion decided to follow the constitution's provision for reaching a quorum—opening the

polls for another 48 hours.

Obviously, this solution was less than ideal considering the fact that the results had been posted, the winning candidates had been notified, and hearts were set on the positions. However, sometimes the right solution isn't the easiest.

Voting was reopened beginning Monday (March 24) at 5 PM and remained open through Wednesday (March 26) at 5 PM. After an anxious, stressful two days a quorum was indeed reached, and, to the relief of the previously announced winning candidates, none of the positions changed after the added votes.

Julie LaLone, ASB Executive Secretary, was concerned for the well-being of all the candidates and the involvement of the entire student body, and made a public apology Tuesday in Chapel for the mistake, and also explained the reasoning behind the Executive Committee's decision to reopen the voting.

The results for the ASB elections include James Storie, reelected as Student Body President, Celesta Cox as Executive Secretary, Brian Walkup as Vice President of Finance, Chad Johnson as Vice President of Public Relations, Nathan Carden as Vice President of Social Life, Jeremy Pass as Student Body Chaplain, and Jessica Hawkins as Vice President of Student Services.

(Pulaski, TN) -- The Trevecca softball team (23-5, 6-4) needed extra innings to claim two victories over TranSouth Conference opponent Martin Methodist College (11-19, 1-5).

(Game 1) -- Martin Methodist took an early 5-0 lead into the fifth inning before the Lady Trojans, led by senior Wendy Allen's three run homer, climbed back with four runs in the fifth inning and a late three run, game winning rally in the top of the final inning to beat the Lady RedHawks 7-5. Hollie Shane picked up her 11th win of the season and went 2 for 3 from the plate with two doubles in the winning effort.

(Game 2) -- Trevecca grabbed the early 2-0 lead this time in the second game thanks to more yard work from senior Wendy Allen who launched a two run homer in the first inning. Martin Methodist tied the game with a run in the third and sixth innings but neither team was finished yet. In the top of the 7th inning with two outs and the bases loaded sophomore Jami Toomey lined a three run double to take the lead. The Lady RedHawks, however, put three runs of their own on the

Trevecca's baseball team takes two out of three games at Union in weekend series

(Jackson, TN) -- The Trevecca baseball team (23-12, 6-6) traveled to Jackson, TN and came out with two wins and a loss in the three game series against Union University. Game one was suspended due to rain in the top of the 8th inning with Trevecca Nazarene leading Union 10-4.

(Game 1) -- Trevecca scored five runs in the top of the second inning and three more runs, one per inning, over the next three innings before rain resulted as the only thing that seemed to be able to stop the Trojans. The game was temporarily postponed on Friday night and resumed Saturday morning with the Trojans leading 10-4. Trevecca added 2 more when the game resumed and

Jenkins fell to 2-4 on the season but threw a complete game six inning performance giving up only three hits in the game.


