The first Trevecka College was opened in Breconshire, Wales, by Rev. Howell Harris with the financial backing of Lady Huntingdon. The school was located at Trevecka, a tiny village in southern Wales.

The college was opened in 1768, with George Whitefield preaching the opening sermon. The first head of the college was the Rev. John Fletcher, a saintly and scholarly man. Many great preachers visited Trevecka from time to time—John Wesley, William Williams, and Augustus Toplady, who wrote "Rock of Ages." An active religious and academic program was set up at the college, and young men were prepared to preach the glorious truth of saving and sanctifying grace.




In 1791 Trevecka College was removed to Ches-hunt. Then in 1904 the college was moved to Cam-bridge, England, where it is located today as Ches-hunt College.

The dream of Christian education knew no con-tinental bounds. In 1901 Rev. J. O. McClurkan founded the Missionary and Bible Training School in Nashville, Tennessee. Rev. McClurkan American-ized Trevecka into Trevecca when he adopted this name for the Bible training school as it reached a collegiate level. Rev. McClurkan wished to reflect in the Bible institute's new name the purpose of the old Trevecka, the training of Christian workers.

The college has had some triumphant, some trou-ble-filled years, but by God's grace and devoted leadership Rev. McClurkan's purpose has been achieved. The college has trained thousands of young men and women for Christian service.

Several campuses housed the college through the years, 1901-1935. At that time the campus on Mur-freesboro Road was purchased and steady progress has been made. The college in 1935 received the name it now bears, Trevecca Nazarene College.

The Trevecca campus of today stands ten buildings strong. The buildings are: the Fine Arts building and McClurkan building; administration building; three girls' dormitories, McKay Hall, Hardy Hall, and Gibbs Hall; one boys' dormitory, Tidwell Hall; cafeteria, president's home; and the new building pictured above which is part of the school's endowment program.

The main buildings are arranged in a quadrangle. The campus lies on a hill just outside the city limits of Nashville. There are fifty acres of land, and the property value of the school is increasing steadily. It now stands at one and a half million dollars.

This is Trevecca today as it appears to the casual observer. But to one who looks deeper there is greater wealth: the Christian dedication of faculty members, the youthful accomplishments and ideals of students and the core of support from the constituency across the Southeastern Zone. This is the greater Trevecca.

In the new office

It seems only yesterday that I first came to Trevecca in the fall of 1925. The college was located on Gallatin Road, and John T. Benson, Sr., was president at that time. The effort of the college was to have an enrollment of fifty college students. There were eighty to one hundred in high school, and fifty to sixty in grade school. I had been teaching in the public schools since 1915. At Peabody College I had completed one quarter of graduate work. My teaching was in the high school for the first few days, and then I was transferred to French and mathematics in college.

During my third of a century at Trevecca College I have served on four campuses, and have served to the best of my ability from the work of a janitor to that of the presidency.

If Trevecca makes approximately the same progress in the next twenty years that it has in the past twenty, it should have a fully accredited graduate school offering the Doctor of Theology and Doctor of Philosophy degrees. It should have campuses and equipment valued at ten million dollars, and should have two thousand students enrolled on the main campus and five hundred in each of two affiliated junior colleges.

The club sponsored a Friday night program, and as a project furnished one of the Fine Arts offices.



Starting the year was a softball game defeat for the "green" Freshmen by the Upperclassmen.


